

November 6th brings earlier music from Burrell, Kibble and Gerard, playing pieces by Couperin, Corelli, Telemann and others.

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Upwey Music

Upwey has a new charity, which has the object of supporting and promoting music performances in the area – and particularly in

St Laurence Church. Originally talked about before the pandemic, it finally got under way this year. The charity has no direct connection to the church, but does want to support the continuing use of a beautiful building – and take advantage of its fine church acoustics.

There have been three concerts so far.

First, in May, there was a delightful performance by local amateur choir, Encore Singers, entitled "Spring Song".

Next, Upwey Music supported Dorchester Choral Society in one of their outreach concerts. (In this context "supported" really means "ran the bar"!). The Choral Society took us through a number of jazz classics such as Autumn Leaves and Let's Do it, plus songs and sonnets from Shakespeare set to music by George Shearing. The most unusual piece was the Geographical Fugue, written for spoken chorus by Ernst Toch. This was a very clever and quite sensational piece to sing as well as to listen to.

As a finale, the choir sang the Ukraine National Anthem in the Ukrainian language and a collection was taken for Ukraine, enabling Dorchester Choral Society to forward the magnificent sum of £1,160 for Ukraine via Christian Aid.

In July Upwey Music presented Sunset Café Stompers featuring vintage jazz from 1920s and 1930s New York, New Orleans and Chicago. This jazz band is based in Bridport and each member of the group enjoys an extraordinary skill with their respective instruments and musical abilities, as well as having some fascinating musical backgrounds. So it was no surprise to be richly entertained. They'll be back!

Upwey Music is promoting three more performances this year.

On October 7th Weymouth Concert Brass will be playing a concert on a watery theme, with sea shanties, film music and classical pieces. On November 11th exceptional guitarist Robbie McIntosh (the Pretenders, Paul McCartney and many more) will be playing with a stripped-down version of his usual band, supported by talented singer/songwriter Hannah Robinson.

And on the afternoon of 11 December there'll be a Christmas concert from One Voice Choir, with popular songs, madrigals, carols and more (including the chance to join in the singing!).

A little bit of history

One of our members, Dr David Thomas, now lives in Solihull and recently renewed his subscription, at the same time emailing some interesting photographs related to a winter experience back in the 1950s, as well as a reference to the floods of 1955. His description and a couple of photos are replicated below for your interest.

'I recently came across some old photos and wondered if any Upwey Society members may be interested so have attached them to this email. The photo of a rather snowy Upwey goods railway station was taken by my friend Alan Bevis who lived in Jesty's Avenue around about the mid 1950's. In the photo titled Abbotsbury Line the person sitting on the rail is Roland Groom, another ex-resident of Jesty's Avenue.'

Dr Thomas vividly recalled scenes of the River Wey flooding following the 24 hour rainfall in mid-July 1955. A Royal Meteorological magazine article reviewed this astonishing event in 1995, noting that Martinstown received 11 inches (279mm) of rain and Upwey just over 7 inches (183mm). All of this happened in just 24 hours. We hope we never see this again.







And another little bit of history

Why "The Big Affair"?

This year we called our now annual (we hope) summer picnic in the grounds of Upwey House "The Big Affair". Some of you might be wondering why.

The name was chosen to reawaken the spirit of the annual Upwey "Big Affair" of the 1940s (if not the amount of work, or the numbers of attendees – read on!).

The first Big Affair was held on August Bank Holiday 1945 in a very similar spot to the modern version. Attractions included a treasure hunt among the trees, riverside teas, a fun fair, and a flower show in a marquee. Among the parades and displays were decorated bicycles (!), skipping and dancing by children, a gymnastic display and more. There were sports including obstacle races, pillow fights (another !) and a tug of war tournament. Entertainment went on into the evening.

That year over 4,800 people attended. So the next year, plans were even more ambitious, and over 13,000 turned up. The event continued for several years, moving to Hurdle Mead.

So it's an honourable tradition that we are carrying on.
